Vision, Mission and Goals

Vision

To create globally competent students who will succeed in working with people of diverse national, ethnic and cultural backgrounds in our internationally interconnected world.

Mission

Columbus State University strives through its nationally recognized comprehensive internationalization strategy to ensure that all students experience our globally engaged campus and become globally competent professionals. Students must have the knowledge, cultural self-awareness, and adaptability to function effectively in an interconnected world. It is through the study of other cultures and by working, living and studying with diverse peoples and in other cultures that CSU graduates will thrive and contribute to their multicultural and globally connected businesses, governments, civic institutions and non-profits.

Program Goals

The Center seeks to empower students to be globally prepared through the following initiatives:

- 1) Infusing international perspectives as broadly as possible across the curricula, particularly in the International Learning Community (ILC) and International Studies Certificate;
- 2) Providing a broad range of quality education abroad programs;
- 3) Promoting and assisting with international development of faculty in collaboration with the Center for Teaching and Learning;
- 4) Ensuring international students receive vital support and services to succeed and provide a strategic resource for on-campus internationalization activities;
- 5) Supporting visiting and exchange scholars who will share their different perspectives and knowledge with CSU faculty and students; and
- Stimulating general campus and community awareness of international issues and other cultures.

Summary

Successes to note in this year's report span across all areas of international education at CSU:


- Number of International Learning Community (ILC) courses was at an all-time high at 59.
- Study abroad enrollments increased by 8.6% in 2016-2017 compared with 2015-2016.
- The International Studies Certificate won approval for INTS 2105 in Areas B & E of the core.
- International student enrollment was the highest it has ever been—up by 14%.

In addition to these successes, the Center for International Education regretfully said goodbye to Director, Dr. Neal McCrillis, who accepted a position at the University of Illinois at Chicago. His impact on international education at CSU will be felt for many years to come. Despite his absence, the CIE continued to move forward with current and new initiatives during Spring 2017. One important partnership has been our work with the Foundation and Alumni offices to secure Kyle Spencer's generous legacy with an endowment. A generous matching grant provided by the Fort Foundation is an important step in the process of soliciting funds to support our students as they prepare for the global workplace by pursuing international education through study abroad and our international curriculum.

Curriculum and Area Studies

International Learning Community: "My Journey, Our World"

CSU organized the tenth annual International Learning Community (ILC). The ILC Subcommittee, chaired by Mariko Izumi, oversaw the program, which included *thirty faculty, fifty-nine classes and approximately one thousand one hundred fifty students* from across the colleges of Columbus State University. The number of ILC classes this year was an all-time record.



The ILC links international learning across disciplines and connects the traditional classroom experience with co-curricular dialogues, lectures, films, field trips and other activities. By these means CSU strives to engage students in their academic pursuits through experiential learning. The goal is to provide a global learning experience that links co-curricular learning with classroom instruction that is itself transnational and cross-cultural.

Highlights of the learning community were the guest lectures, panels, field trips, international films and Global Dialogues. The International Education Fee provided funding to support the co-curricular programming. During the seventeen Global Dialogue sessions, U.S. and international students were able to learn from each other through structured discussions led by international students, particularly International Student Service Scholarship recipients. The dialogue topics are crafted with input from the ILC faculty and based on the theme.

During the next academic year, the learning community will begin its first three-year theme, "Migrations: Movement(s) Around the Globe," which will also include the ILC's first Faculty Development Workshop Abroad in Oxford during September 2017.

International Studies Certificate

The International Studies Certificate (ISC) Program has two over-arching goals: 1) to enable CSU students to incorporate international learning into their existing majors, and 2) to integrate study abroad and other experiential international learning into academic courses and programs. This is the fourth year during which students signed up for the ISC Program, coordinated by Dr. Becky Becker, Professor of Theatre and Interim Executive Director for CSU's Center for International Education.

During summer 2016 Becker offered INTS 2105 Introduction to International Studies and Cross-Cultural Learning as part of the London Intern Study Abroad Program. One of only a few study abroad internship programs offered by CSU, the London Internship Program was specifically designed to allow students pursuing the International Studies Certificate to earn 9 hours during one summer, completing an international internship in the process. During summer 2016 a group of 8 students from four different majors enrolled in the interdisciplinary program completing internships at such venues as

the Institute of Sales and Marketing Management, FareShare, Iris Theatre, Urdang Academy and Westminster Archives, to name a few. This also marked the second summer during which Becker held regular office hours at the Center for International Education in her capacity as Assistant Director, before stepping into the role of Interim Executive Director upon Neal McCrillis's departure for a new position.

During Fall 2016 Becker offered the INTS 2105 course to a group of 15 students, a number of whom are pursuing the certificate. As part of the course, students researched and prepared an event during International Education Week, the 4th annual "International Studies Fits You to a 'T." The event involved students from INTS 2105 serving coffees and teas from around the world while a Powerpoint presentation of their research and information on the International Studies Certificate played. Bringing IE Week to a close, the tea event was quite successful, drawing upwards of 70 participants. Continuing their previous collaboration, Becker invited students from Paige Burns' English Language Institute courses to visit with the INTS 2105 class, facilitating dialogue among domestic and international students. Becker's and Burns' students met twice during the semester, once at Elizabeth Bradley Turner Center and once at the International House, sharing refreshments and dialogue. In addition to teaching the ISC introductory course, Becker continued to promote the certificate, facilitating visits to more than 15 CSU classes from a variety of departments across campus with the help of our ISC Student Ambassador, Caleb Jarrett. In an effort to make the International Studies Certificate accessible to more students, McCrillis and Becker submitted a proposal to allow INTS 2105 to count in Areas B and E of the core curriculum. In November, the proposal was approved by CSU's Interdisciplinary Council and University Curriculum Committee. During Fall 2016 five students graduated with the International Studies Certificate: Amanda Black and Natalie Brock, both theatre; Rachel Funk, History Education; Katie Grego, Geology; and Tatyana Foster, Biology.

Spring 2017 marked the second time Becker offered INTS 2105 during the spring semester. As in 2016, the class filled, but seemed to comprise few students who were already signed up for the certificate. With the assistance of ISC Student Ambassador, Hannah Turner, Becker facilitated more than 20 class visits to promote the certificate. During Spring 2017 eight students completed the International Studies Certificate, graduating with their respective degrees: Cailee Davis and Jane Mader, both History & Geography; Eliana Gilbert and Nathan Petty, both Theatre; Katie Holmes, Music; Kelsie Hughes, History Education; Katy Neill, Art History; and Columbia Renix, Early Childhood Education.

As of May 2017, approximately 55 students are registered in the database for the International Studies Certificate. Becker continues to promote the certificate through an "ISC Interest" list of more than 1000 students that has been compiled from classroom visits, general presentations, and referrals. During Summer 2017 Dr. Becker will again teach INTS 2105 as part of the London Internship Study Abroad Program; all four students participating in the summer program are enrolled in the international studies course and intend to pursue the certificate.

Mildred Miller Fort Foundation Visiting Scholar in European Studies

During Spring 2017 CSU hosted Doru Pop as the Mildred Miller Fort Foundation Visiting Scholar in European Studies. Pop was the 16th Columbus State University Mildred Miller Fort Foundation Visiting Scholar. A professor at the Faculty of Theatre and Television, Babeş-Bolyai University in Cluj, Romania, his research interests include cinema and media studies, visual culture and political ideologies and mythologies.

During his time at CSU Pop taught courses on "Media, Society and Culture" and "European Film: From National Identity to Transnational Cultures". He also gave a two-part public lecture series at the Center for International Education, which lectures were also part of the International Learning Community. Titles of these talks were "Americans Abroad: The 'Good American' in Film," and "Americans Abroad: The 'Bad American' in Film." Pop remained very active in his scholarship, serving as a distinguished guest for the Romanian Film Festival at UC Berkeley and San Francisco

State University in April 2017. He also worked diligently on his most recent book project, completing a draft just prior to leaving CSU.

In 2000 the late Mrs. Mildred Miller Fort provided generous support to establish an annual Fort Foundation Visiting Scholar in European Studies. Her foundation continues this important work of bringing unique international classes and new perspectives to Columbus State University students. In addition, the Fort Foundation Visiting Scholars bring important research opportunities and collaboration to our faculty.

Elena Diaz-Verson Amos Eminent Scholar in Latin American Studies

From year to year, CSU typically hosts the Elena Diaz-Verson Amos Eminent Scholar in Latin American Studies during Fall or Spring semester, depending upon availability of qualified applicants. The late Mrs. Elena Diaz-Verson Amos provided generous funds establishing the Amos Eminent Scholar Endowment in 1998. For almost two decades, the fund has supported the annual eminent scholar.

During the 2016-2017 academic year, no one was identified to fulfill this prestigious fellowship. However, we are very pleased to announce that Professor Gabriel Villa will join the CSU community as the Elena Diaz-Verson Amos Eminent Scholar in Latin American Studies for Fall 2017.

Broadway Crossing Visiting Scholar Apartments

Columbus State opened the Visiting Scholar Apartments at the start of August 2013 with a generous donation from the Mildred Miller Fort Foundation. The three apartments are located at the RiverPark campus near the corner of 10th Street and Broadway, within easy walking distance of the thriving downtown district and the river.

This year's Fort Foundation Visiting Scholar enjoyed living in these apartments. During the year CIE and CSU were pleased to *host nearly thirty visiting scholars* in the Broadway Crossing Visiting Scholar Apartments.

Faculty Development

Study Abroad Teaching and Directing

Faculty members play a central role in comprehensive internationalization. Through teaching and involvement in international programs, faculty members bring the world to CSU. Teaching a study abroad class enables faculty members to teach through action and experience but also to recast classes at home by heightening the international content and perspectives. The Center also works closely all year with faculty members developing or administering programs and teaching in programs. Thirty-one faculty members taught or directed study abroad programs during the academic year. Faculty participation and support is essential to the development and operation of study abroad programs and the recruitment of students into programs.



Study Abroad Program Development Grants

Four faculty members received Study Abroad Program Development Grants from the International Education Fee to develop new programs or revise existing programs. Nathan Combes received a grant to conduct a site visit in Greece. Tesa Leonce received a grant to visit Ireland for the Ireland Business Study Abroad Program. Erinn Bentley and Draevious Hurston-White received a grant to visit Ecuador for the Education, Culture and Diversity Study Abroad Program in Quito.

Study Abroad and Exchange Programs


Study abroad enrollment increased by approximately 8% from last year. A total of 202 students studied abroad this year, which allows us to bounce back nicely from last year's decrease in enrollment. This year we implemented a new website and online application system through Terra Dotta. Although we experienced the normal learning curve that is expected with any new system, it was well received after a bit of training. We will continue to use Terra Dotta for our website and online applications and make improvements on how we use it in the coming year.



The Center utilized a series of marketing publications, including a general brochure, a grants and scholarship handout, and a brochure template for all faculty-led and semester programs. The publication "branding" continues to provide more cohesion in the recruitment effort, and the Center will continue to use the template for the upcoming recruitment cycle.

The Center continued the successful Global Ambassador Program. Eight study abroad returnees were selected as Global Ambassadors and provided walk-in peer advising for students in the Center for International Education. In addition, our Global Ambassadors made study abroad presentations in 160 classes to increase students' interest in studying abroad. Our Global Ambassadors attended the Lessons From Abroad Study Abroad Returnee Conference in Atlanta, Georgia. Students attended workshops, listened to keynote speakers, and networked with fellow study abroad returnees and professionals in international education.

Although two of the study abroad programs were cancelled due to low enrollment this year, three new programs were successfully implemented. The Center will be working with the program directors of the canceled programs to develop new approaches or techniques that will lead to the success of these programs in the future.



Study Abroad Enrollment by Category

This year the following programs exceeded their enrollment targets, CSU in Italy Art/Art History, CSU in Southern Spain Spanish Immersion, CSU in Mexico Spanish Immersion, CSU in Oxford Summer Session I English/Education and the CSU in South Korea TESOL Internship Practicum. It is important to mention that this is the first year that the CSU in Southern Spain Spanish Immersion program was offered. Therefore, CIE would like to congratulate Dr. Bobby Nixon, for exceeding his enrollment targets for his first faculty-led program. The CSU in England Education Leadership program remains a strong program, just missing its target by one student and CSU in Costa Rica Intercultural Leadership Service Learning program also had strong numbers missing its target by two students, which is commendable for the first time the program was offered.


In September, during International Education Week, the Center hosted the annual Study Abroad Fair to introduce students to all of the programs being offered. This year we added a scavenger hunt to the fair to make it more interactive and encourage more dialogue between students and the faculty and providers representing study abroad opportunities. Once again the Cougar Passport Competition was held, for students attending the fair and other International Education Week events. Three students won and used their awards for their study abroad programs. In addition, the Center held well in excess of two hundred recruitment events across the campus:

- Weekly Information Tables at various locations across campus (10)
- Classroom presentations and information sessions (167)
- CSU Visitation Day presentations, including tables and information panels (5)
- Presentations for Funding/Financial Aid, Honors, Residence Life, the Freshman Year Seminar Experience, Cougar Kickoff, etc. (7)
- ROAR Orientations (32)

The Study Abroad Coordinator and summer Global Ambassador were very active in the 2016 new student orientations with concurrent sessions for students, parent lunch presentations as well as information tables.

In order to continue to increase study abroad enrollment next year, the Center will continue to work closely with academic departments and student affairs offices to diversify its outreach to CSU students. The Center will also continue the Global Ambassador Program enabling returned study abroad students the opportunity to share their international experiences with the campus. The Center maintained its number of diverse students compared to the previous year. The Center will continue to increase study abroad student diversity as we continue to encourage students of various ethnicities to study abroad.

New Programs

The Center assisted faculty members in developing and leading three new programs this academic year: The CSU in Ireland Leadership in Education Spring Break Program, the CSU in Costa Rica Intercultural Leadership Service Learning Spring Break Program, and the CSU in Southern Spain Spanish Immersion Maymester Program. All of the programs were successful. CSU also exchanged the first students with one of our new partners, Florence University of the Arts in Florence, Italy.

During the current year, the Center was fortunate to develop three more direct enrollment partnerships. These new linkages are with the University of Waikato in New Zealand, National University of Ireland, Galway and Manchester Metropolitan University in the United Kingdom. In addition, faculty members successfully developed two new faculty-led programs: "Come From Away: Transatlantic Migration in Newfoundland, Canada - Canadian Music and Literature," led by Dr. Andreé Martin and Dr. Susan Hrach, and CSU in Greece – Democracy: "Where it all began," led by Dr. Nathan Combes and Dr. Troy Vidal of Political Science.

Scholarships and Study Abroad Grants


Approximately 285 scholarship and grant awards were given to students participating in study abroad programs. The study abroad grant, funded by the International Education Fee, continues to be in high demand as demonstrated by the long line of waiting students on the mornings when grants become available. For the third year in a row every student who applied for the grant and met the criteria received a grant.

Due to the continued generosity of donors, CSU has many study abroad scholarships provided by the Fort Foundation, Kyle Spencer, the Nakai Fund, the Kidd-Bagley Fund, the Katherine and LeGrand Elebash Fund, and the Tower Society.

This year another one of our study abroad students won the State Department's Gilman A. Benjamin International Scholarship. Approximately 1,000 outstanding students nation-wide were chosen out of over 3,900 applicants. Our student will be participating in the CSU in Southern Spain Spanish Immersion Program.




International Students

In continuing our goal for comprehensive Campus Internationalization we search for cross-cultural learning opportunities between U.S. and international students through new initiatives and expansion of current initiatives. CIE has increased international student involvement in the community by informing students of community volunteer opportunities. Partnerships with local community groups and organizations continue to expand to provide programming for our students. Current community partnerships include The International Network of Columbus, International Friendship Ministries, Second Story, and Christ Community Church. Students also volunteer with organizations such as Habitat for Humanity, Tri-Columbus, GA, House of Heroes, and many others. During the past year CSU internal partners included the Student Activities Council, History and Geography Club, Baptist Collegiate Ministries and the Japanese Club. CSU students from these organizations hosted events for our international students and visiting Kiryu, Japan high school students.

Enrollments


During the 2016-2017 academic year, CSU enrolled a total of 146 international students on J and F visas during the fall semester and 139 international students during the spring semester. CSU has an estimated additional 30 students per semester that are here on various other Visas.



During the Fall 2016 semester the top six countries from which CSU received the most students were India (24), China (15), South Korea (14), Colombia (9), Nigeria (6) and Canada (5). During the Spring 2017 semester the top sending countries were India (28), China (14), Colombia (13), Canada, Japan, Nigeria, South Africa and South Korea, all with (5) students each. Columbus State University's TSYS School of Computer Science Department continues to work with recruitment agents, resulting in an increase of 85% from Fall 2015 to Fall 2016 in our Indian student population.

Columbus State graduated 28 international students in Spring 2017. This speaks highly of the retention efforts of our university and is proof that we are successfully providing excellent student services to our international student population.


We continue to foster partnerships with South Korean universities for one-semester exchange programs. In the fall a new partnership was formed with the National University of Ireland, Galway and we were excited to welcome our first exchange student from that institution for Spring 2017. Each semester Columbus State has students enrolled from approximately 40 different countries.



International students represented approximately 1.7% of CSU's regular student population during Fall 2016 semester. Georgia ranks 15th in the U.S. in the number of foreign students in the state at 21,122, with the heaviest population in the Atlanta area attending Georgia Tech. The majority of these students are from China (29.7 %) with India (16 %) second in ranking. International students contributed approximately \$683,357,606 in the state of Georgia in 2016 [Based on NAFSA and the Institute of International Education 2016 Open Door report].

Top Majors for International Students

Currently CSU's most popular majors are Music (28%), Computer Science (22%), Business (18%), and English Language studies (13%). In contrast to most U.S. institutions, CSU has a large number of international students studying music due to the program's reputation and the scholarships provided.



Programming

- International Student Service Scholarship (ISSS) The International Student Service Scholarship (ISSS) was started in August 2007. Each semester fourteen students are awarded ISSS waivers for in-state tuition. In return, these students are required to complete twenty-five "service" hours for CIE, CSU and in the community. Students assist with International Student Orientation, Global Dialogues, community events and many other internationalization activities. These students are very active and have formed a very cohesive group that has flourished into a leadership team for the Center for International Education. Five of our scholarship students graduated, therefore, we will be able to award those scholarships to current students and new students who apply.
- World at Reach Program The World at Reach Program places international students in classrooms on campus and in the local community to give presentations or informal talks on topics relevant to the student's international experience.
- Global Dialogues Global Dialogues are round-table discussions between international and U.S. students about various topics. Global Dialogue forums provide a venue for exchange of ideas, opinions and viewpoints and a way to gain new perspectives from diverse cultures. With the support of the International Learning Community instructors, Global Dialogues included approximately 541 students. There were 214 participants during Fall 2016 and 327 participants during Spring 2016. There are nine Global Dialogues each semester, two of which are at our RiverPark campus. The goal is to provide every CSU student the opportunity to become involved in cross-cultural programming. Fall 2016 and Spring 2017 sessions were led by students, including a CIE graduate assistant and some of our Service Scholarship students. The International Learning Community has changed from a one-year to a three-year theme. "Migrations: Movement(s) Around the Globe" will be the new topic and all events and Global Dialogue sessions will be based on this theme. Friday lunch sessions were added in Fall 2016 and were very well attended, so these will continue in future semesters.
- Georgia International Leadership Conference The Georgia International Leadership Conference is an annual gathering of various international and study abroad students across the state of Georgia. Students come together to network, share ideas, and develop leadership qualities. CIE sent a delegation of ten study abroad and international students to attend the conference, along with two Diversity Peer Educators from the Office of Diversity Programs and Services.
- **Field Trips** CIE tries to plan at least one field trip per semester for International Students depending on student interest in participation.
- International Student Security & Well-Being Sessions During spring semester 2017 two such sessions were held to provide security and counseling information to international students at CSU. Campus Police and the Counseling Center joined with CIE to host international students and faculty in a discussion on safety tips and resources for student security and well-being. These sessions will be added to the regular, ongoing services for international students in 2017-2018.

International Student Services

Admitting and retaining international students necessitates providing services beyond those generally offered to U.S. students. Some accomplishments this year include the following:

- Continued community group collaboration to provide a Holiday Dinner, a Spring Cookout and a Welcome Dinner for new international students
- Continuous upgrading of the International Student Services web site to include more pertinent information
- Weekly office hours on the River Park campus to give students easy access to advising and services

Student Award

Kiongozi means "leader" in Swahili. The **Kiongozi Award for Outstanding International Leadership** is the only award at CSU specifically for international students. It is awarded to one graduating international student (either undergraduate or graduate) each academic year based on demonstrated extra-curricular involvement, academic success and leadership. The 2016 – 2017 Kiongozi award was presented to Saravinder Pannu at the CSU Legacy Banquet. Pannu, a citizen of New Zealand, is a Senior Communications major with a CSU grade point average of 3.0. Pannu is an International Student Scholarship recipient, and is a member of CSU's high achieving Women's Tennis team.

American Cross Cultural Experience (ACCE)

The American Cross-Cultural Experience (ACCE) Program is only available to students at partner universities of Columbus State University. English proficient students at these institutions may enroll in full-time study (12-15 credit hours per semester) in regularly offered academic courses for one or two semesters. This will provide an opportunity for students selected at partner universities to experience a real American university, learn in an English-speaking environment and study subjects typically not offered at their home university.

The "CSU CounterParts" component matches a regular CSU student mentor (typically an International Studies Certificate student or study abroad returnee) with each ACCE student on a one-to-one basis. "CSU CounterParts" will participate in weekly student-to-student cross-cultural activities organized by the Center for International Education and serve as an international "buddy," sharing knowledge of CSU, Columbus and America. Weekly activities have included various games and cultural activities.

ACCE also provides extra support services and learning opportunities beyond the classroom including monthly field trips to area museums, sporting events and attractions at no additional cost. Field trips have included Six Flags, CNN, Callaway Gardens, Georgia Aquarium, World of Coke, Providence Canyon and Historic Westville.

International Linkages and Partnerships

Columbus State University has formal partnerships with thirty-one universities and organizations around the world. A few of these relationships date back many years but most have been developed during the past decade. Agreements with international partners serve students and faculty at both institutions. In many cases the partnership is intended to develop student exchanges and other academic programs. Longtime Director Departs, Bringing New Staff to CIE

In February 2017, the Center for International Education and Columbus State University celebrated outgoing Executive Director of the CIE, Dr. Neal McCrillis. McCrillis accepted the position of Vice Provost for International Affairs at the University of Illinois at Chicago, taking up that post in March 2017. Nearly twenty years ago in 1998, McCrillis came to CSU as the Mildred Miller Fort Foundation Eminent Scholar Chair of International Studies and Executive Director of the Center for International Education. As the title implies, McCrillis played a major role in building CSU's strong study abroad programs and on campus international education opportunities. Under his leadership, CSU received the 2014 Paul Simon Award for Comprehensive Internationalization. The impact of McCrillis's work will be felt for many years to come.

Upon McCrillis's departure, Dr. Becky Becker assumed the role of Interim Executive Director of the CIE, after having served as Assistant Director for two years. Stepping into the role of Interim Assistant Director is Dr. Shamim Khan, professor of Computer Science at CSU. Also joining the CIE during spring semester 2017, Dr. Dan Ross holds the new position of Oxford Program Director, overseeing Oxford Summer Study Abroad Programs and the Oxford Visiting Student Program.

The Legacy of Kyle Spencer

Kyle Spencer, who sadly passed away in July 2015, was a very strong advocate and constant supporter of international education, particularly the CSU in Oxford Program. His interest dated from the early 1980s when he and his late wife took Oxford tutorials with Mr. David Vaisey, former head of the Bodleian Library at the University of Oxford.

In 2002 Mr. Spencer very generously provided the funding that enabled CSU to purchase the Spencer House at 182 Woodstock Road, near Summertown, Oxford. *Between January 2003 and today Columbus State University has operated 60 programs in the Spencer House, and 740 faculty members and students have studied there because of Mr. Spencer's generosity.* He also provided generous funding for the Spencer Scholars, enabling our best CSU students to study at the University of Oxford as Visiting Students for the same cost as attending CSU. Mr. Spencer's legacy to the Columbus State University, its students and faculty, will be felt for many decades to come.

Grants and Gifts

The Center for International Education depends very heavily upon financial support from donors and outside organizations. It is not possible for most CSU students to participate in study abroad programs without significant financial support.

CSU Study Abroad Grants, funded by the International Education Student Fee, are vital to broadening participation in international education over the past two years. The vast majority of fee revenue was used to provide \$161,100 in Study Abroad Grants. Small amounts were also used for the International Learning Community programming and study abroad program development.

In 2015-2016, the CIE launched a fundraising drive to create a permanent endowment that will provide scholarships, particularly to support CSU in Oxford Visiting Students. Last year Faculty members contributed over \$10,000 to this fund. During fall 2016 an appeal was launched to study abroad alumni in collaboration with the Alumni Office and we hope to soon seek support from a broader segment of the Columbus community.

Before his passing Kyle Spencer provided very generous support for the Spencer Scholars who were able to participate in the CSU in Oxford Visiting Student Program despite the high tuition cost of the University of Oxford. A generous donation from the Fort Foundation in his memory has enabled the program to continue through Spring 2017 and beyond. An organization that is constantly looking to the future, the Fort Foundation has again demonstrated its support of international education at CSU, pledging a substantial matching gift toward the scholarship endowment. This endowment is essential for CSU to continue to offer the nationally recognized CSU in Oxford Visiting Student Program as well as other study abroad programs that make such a significant impact on students' lives.
